

## Jiggs the Lighthouse Cat

A read-aloud story for kids to read with adults.

Under the back porch of the quarters at California's Pigeon Point Lighthouse, on April 22, 1927, a litter of kittens was born. As their mother washed them and pressed their tiny bodies close to hers for warmth, one kitten caught her attention. He had funny black spots spattered over his white head and body, and he seemed especially playful.

Eyes sealed shut and still unable to hear, he lifted his wobbly, newborn head and sniffed the air. Morning fog had come to the hidden birthplace his mother had chosen. He caught a whiff of salt air, tangy and cold against his small pink nose. A moment later his mother gripped him by the neck and moved him into the line of kittens against her belly. She probably had no idea this kitten would become famous for his antics at two lighthouses and have an eternal resting place at a third lighthouse.


The Henderson family named the kitten Jiggs. He quickly became the beloved pet of all the Hendersons, but especially six-year-old George. Life was challenging at California's tallest lighthouse, and a boy felt lucky if he had a warm furry friend. Jiggs slept in a doll bed next to the kitchen stove. This was the warmest place in the house. Sometimes he

crawled in bed with little George and nestled deep under the blankets against the boy's side.

moved south with the
Hendersons to the Point
Sur Lighthouse. The
family loved their pets and
wouldn't have left Jiggs
behind for any reason.
Jiggs was now full-grown.
He adjusted well to life on
windy Point Sur. The family
allowed him to join them
indoors, of course, but this
frightened Miss Graham, the
itinerant teacher who lived

with the Hendersons. Jiggs had a habit of walking along the legs of the chairs under the dinner table, even when those same chairs were occupied at mealtime with people. One evening, his erect tail brushed the backside of Miss Graham's legs and gave her a terrible fright. Thereafter,



Mrs. Henderson served the teacher her meals in her room—a fact that underscored Jiggs' importance. He outranked the teacher.

Jiggs had a contented life at Point Sur Light, chasing bugs, harassing the chickens, and playing with the many children living at the station in the 1930s. He found warm places to take daytime naps and slept with young George at night. He liked to be in the kitchen when Mrs. Henderson was cooking. Sometimes she dropped a treat for





him on the floor—a piece of meat, a dab of cottage cheese, or maybe a small chunk of cheddar. She always pretended these tidbits fell to the floor by accident!

Jiggs was only nine-years-old when he became sick. The Hendersons did not know why their kitty was ill. They tried several medicines, but nothing worked. Jiggs quietly died December 1936. The Hendersons were very sad. They placed his body in a cat-sized concrete crypt and buried it on the windblown bluff near the lighthouse. On the front of the crypt was inscribed "JIGGS Apr. 22, 1927—Dec.20, 1936."




A few years later the family moved to Point Pinos Lighthouse at Monterey. Unable to leave their beloved cat friend behind, they dug up his crypt and carried it to their new home. Jiggs was re-buried in a peaceful spot on the

lighthouse lawn under some trees. There he remained, his eternal sleep never to be disturbed again.


Thousands of tourists have passed by his grave over the years and wondered who this character was. The volunteers of the present-day Point Pinos Lighthouse love tell his story—Jiggs the cat, who slept in a cradle, loved a young boy named George, and moved from lighthouse to lighthouse in life and in death.
